The summer months have seen us back at Scarness for canoeing, kayaking and, this season, a lot more sailing.

area and hiking in Borrowdale. The Cumbrian weather granted us a glorious half-term so we celebrated with swimming in Derwent water before fish and chips and an exhausting couple of hours at King Kong climbing centre.

Summer Camp was the finale to the summer. We returned to Great Tower and the Scouts got to try their hand at rafting, crate stacking, bouldering. Another first for us this year was the chance to swap tents for hammocks which received an almost universal thumbs up!

Looking to the year ahead – we're trying to get to grips with the new Challenge badges, including our first ever expedition challenge later this term. As we get closer to the summer we'll be focussing on developing our skills ready for next summer's jamboree adventure.

The Group Finances remain healthy, increases in our major expenditure have stabilised. The annual subscriptions received have slightly fallen due to group numbers slightly "shrinking".

Subscriptions are due at the start of each term and should be submitted as soon as possible, with over 100 members we would normally remind parents that the subs are expected in a general newsletter if one is being issued. If not, the leaders will mention it verbally at the beginning or end of the first couple of sessions in the new term. Thank you to everyone who pays promptly, your co-operation is very much appreciated. It should be noted that to minimise administration, individual reminders are only sent out by exception if payments have not been made after 4 weeks. A fair amount of effort is spent in ensuring missed payments are kept to a minimum, which no doubt are usually due to oversight, it is very important that our normal income can meet the expected annual costs and that the subs can be kept as low as possible.

A monthly standing order option is also available on request, it is worth emphasising that the instructions need to be followed in order that the subscription can be tracked to the member making the payment! If you would also like to make a one off payment for your subs online this can also be accepted – please use the standing order account details for this payment – including the reference for your child to aid traceability.

In addition to our Current Account we also have funds in a Reserve Account. The total amount held is considered to be sufficient to allow us to continue to operate the normal activities of the Group for 12 months, also should income and fundraising activities fall short, as well as having adequate provision for future maintenance / disposal of our storage facility at Hensingham School. This account currently is "stable" as the current financial market and subsequent low % returns on interest - yield very little for the group – this being set by the bank at 0.05%!

The major source of normal income to supplement our funds from subscription remains our annual Gift Aid claim. Gift Aid is essential in helping the Group finances go further, if you haven't signed up but are eligible, please do so, it's very simple and won't cost you a thing. The subs and Gift Aid money covers the basic costs of running the Group.

Most events and trips are self-financing but we do fund raise to enable us to organise subsidised Group and social events such as the AGM and family camp. We have a nominal budget for each section's programmed activities throughout the year, any surplus money goes directly back into the Group funds which together with any other funds raised are spent on equipment expenditures, such as new tents and camping equipment which is a shared resource and benefit the whole Group.

Our main fundraising carried out this year was yet again the bag packing at Morrisons, which raised a massive £1585. Furthermore we were gifted donations and the group curry night was a great success, both items accounted to a total in excess of £1200. These vital funds support the group being able to subsidise events like our very successful family camp.

As usual, the year-end accounts for the previous financial year 2014/15 have been compiled and the Annual Returns and the accounts were submitted to the Charity Commission using the online account and the Trustee information updated. A summary of our accounts is available on the <u>Charity</u> Commission website.

Finally 1st Hensingham Scout Group would like to take this opportunity to thank all our sponsors, benefactors and fundraisers for their continued support during this year.

We continue to claim Gift Aid on membership fees which add to the group funds by a sizable amount, so if you or your partner are a UK taxpayer and haven't filled in a Gift Aid form please do so at the earliest opportunity.

Mothers' Day weekend saw us embark on our annual bag packing day at Morrisons in Whitehaven. The hard work and packing skills of our young members and adult helpers saw us raise a fantastic £1585.75. Thank you to all our young members and adult helpers who helped make the day a huge success. In addition a big thank you is due once again to Morrisons for their hospitality. Hopefully we can book the corresponding weekend for March 2017 so please save Saturday 25 March in your diaries.

This year saw the Group flex its culinary muscle and expand our fundraising events when we held our inaugural Curry Night at St. Johns Church Hall in January of this year. The night saw our Scouts dish up a variety of Indian dishes which were devoured by all the guests. The evening was a great success raising £388 and everyone going home well fed and having enjoyed the craic with fellow diners.

Building on the success of the Curry Night July saw the Group hold the 'Proof is in the pudding' fundraiser. The guests enjoyed an epic selection of carefully prepared puddings and took part a great social evening. We raised a total of £445.98, another great effort, which has allowed us to repair and rewaterpoof our mess tents.
