SCOUTS

Another year has flown by and it's been fantastic to see how our Scouts have jumped into tackling the different experiences and challenges that we've been able to offer; in the last year we've awarded 155 challenge and activity badges, welcomed 13 new Scouts to the Troop and clocked up over 230 Scout nights away across 6 different camps.



The Chief Scout's Gold Award is the highest award a Scout can earn and completing it takes a lot of commitment, we were delighted to be able present Zak Charlton with his last year before he moved on to Explorers. Several of our other Scouts have made significant progress with their award; Josh, Jacob, Alfie, Ben & Jaydon faced torrential rain and blazing sun to complete their Expedition Challenge in June, and we were very proud of Orion whose Personal Challenge to himself was to raise money for charity by completing a sponsored bike ride.



One of our highlights for the year was knife making camp. Taking inspiration from our Danish Scouting friends, we made our own whittling knives – carving the handles and sewing the sheaths – with some really superb results. We also introduced the Scouts to Patrol camping and our Patrol Leaders and Assistant Patrol Leaders admirably stepped up to the challenge of leading their fellow Scouts to set-up and run their own campsites and cook for themselves (and the leaders); we'll certainly be camping this way again! This year's summer camp saw us head out of Cumbria into neighbouring Lancashire (which it turns out is no drier). Despite the rain the Scouts enjoyed raft building, snow sports at Chill Factor^e, rifle shooting and the on-site ropes course amongst other activities; we even persuaded them all to have a wash by taking them to Sandcastle Waterpark!



Adventurous activities weren't just part of our camp programme; we've been climbing at Keswick, sailing and kayaking at Scarness through the summer and we've had twenty Scouts complete their Master at Arms activity badge and gain a national air rifle shooting award. We're already looking to see how we can keep this going over the coming year.



With last year's adventures already seeming a distant memory, we're planning the next year with a return to the national Scouts Wintercamp in Kielder Forest planned for January and a return to Denmark on the cards for summer camp. Regular Troop meetings continue to be a blend of traditional Scouting skills and more random activities suggested by the Scouts, we've been baking chocolate brownies in ovens made from cardboard and cooking sweet treats over open

fires. As ever, none of our programme would be possible without the commitment of our young and adult leaders and we wouldn't enjoy it without the enthusiasm and energy of the Scouts themselves – we're all looking forward to another fantastic year.



Treasurer's Report

The Group Finances for the financial year of 2018/19 remain healthy. The increased costs previously accepted for the store at Sneckyeat are well embedded and the store has proved a real asset.

With just over 110 members and approximately 30/40 new starters/leavers each year our subscription and subsequent accounts are constantly changing.

The Online Scout Manager (OSM) system is now the main method of payment for subscriptions and various other events. Please could I ask all those still paying by other options to consider switching to OSM for payments as it really helps our leaders. The system also automatically reminds you if you have overlooked making a payment. It is very important that our normal income can meet the expected annual costs and that the subs can be kept as low as possible, so thank you to everyone who pays promptly, your co-operation is very much appreciated.

The major source of normal income to supplement our funds from subscriptions remains our annual Gift Aid claim. With your help, gift aiding generated income to just over £1700 this year. If you haven't signed up but are eligible, please do so - it's very simple and won't cost you a thing. Gift Aid is essential in helping the

Group finances go further; together subs and the money claimed from Gift Aid cover the basic running costs of the Group.

Most events and trips are self-financing but we do fundraise to allow us to offer financial support to those members who need it, as well allowing us to organise subsidised Group and social events (such as the AGM and Family camp for example).

Our main fundraising activities in the last financial year were 2 bag packs at Morrisons and the tea towel fundraiser at Christmas time. Together these raised just over the £3,000 mark. I would like to say a big thank you to everyone who purchased tea towels and who volunteered their time at the bag packs, and of course to everyone who donated at the bag packing.

As usual, the Annual Returns and the year-end accounts for the previous financial year (2017/18) and updated Trustee information were submitted to the Charity Commission. A summary of our accounts is available on the Charity Commission website.

Finally I would like to take this opportunity to thank all our sponsors, benefactors and fundraisers for their continued support during this year.

We have renewed the lease for our equipment store at Sneckyeat Industrial Estate for a further 3 years, accepting that these facilities come at a necessary additional cost to the group.

Fundraising

Bag packing: Our annual supermarket bag pack took place in February at Morrisons, resulting in significant funds being raised for the group. Morrisons staff remember that our group return every year, and have commented on the excellent behaviour and attitude of our members. Thank you to all members, parents and leaders who helped with this event.
