

Wow, what a busy year we've had – the challenge is going to be doing justice to it and keeping within our word count! Over the course of the year we've seen a number of our regulars move on to Explorers but their shoes have been more than filled by the new faces who've moved up from Cubs or joined us directly. As a result troop numbers have stayed stable at around 20 scouts per night. After the last AGM the summer saw us spend the driest 5 days of the summer holidays at Ennerdale with the scouts navigating their way around and across the Lake, improving their archery skills and building coracles. The wet theme continued at the end of the holidays with an afternoon of wet games, BBQ and wide games at Ennerdale.

Our autumn term programme was focussed around the fitness challenge with a number of the troop earning their badges, although healthy eating went out the window for our sweet themed cookery night at Mirehouse (toffee strong enough to pull teeth) and our camp at Alton Towers (we joined scouts from across the



UK to sleep in park and make full use of the water park and rides – a great time was had by all, even if we were a little bit late getting home)! Our Halloween night in half term was our penultimate event at Mirehouse and we took full advantage of not having to worry too much about cleaning up – if the scouts were surprised at how messy they got, it was nothing compared to the parents!

Our spring programme saw a mixture of challenges from playing the Price is Right to inflicting some truly



terrifying injuries on each other (all fake) as part of practising for the first aid badge. Probably the biggest challenge of the term was getting to Ennerdale for our joint Winter Camp with the Cubs but everyone made it eventually and even though there was no snow everyone seemed to enjoy themselves.

Easter saw our second major camp as our Traditional Summer Camp was brought forward a few months. Building on the success of our last two Summer Camps we went to the far and distant lands of Yorkshire for our longest camp yet (7 nights under canvas), and managed to get our highest turn-out so far! With tents pitched we battled it out in the cooking competition,

avoided hypothermia whilst ghyll scrambling and caving, and went crate stacking in the dark to name just a few highlights of the week!

Over the last term we've been getting back to some of the traditional scouting skills such as pioneering and map/compass work. An excellent turnout from the troop to clear litter from the local area as part of Scout Community Week got us our second feature of the year in the Whitehaven News and raised over £300 in sponsorship.

In addition to our normal meetings and weekend events Paul's expertise has allowed us to run two air rifle courses leading to either the Master at Arms or Master at Arms Plus activity badges, and our first air rifle shooting competition. Alf, with some help from Pete and Chris Evans, has been encouraging several of the troop to work towards their Photographer's badge with some evening workshops, and with the lighter evenings we've also been able to offer kayaking, canoeing and sailing thanks to the County water activities team's sessions at Scarness.

On behalf of all the leaders – thanks to the scouts for making running the troop something we look forward to and for their enthusiasm at getting involved with all the activities on offer. Hopefully 2013/14 will be just as exciting!

The Group Finances continues to be healthy, once again there is no need to raise the termly subscription which will remain the same as it has been for many years now (£20 for Beavers and Cubs; £25 for Scouts), as well as retaining the family discounts (£5 discount for a sibling(s)). Subscriptions are due at the start of each term and should be submitted as soon as possible, with over 100 members, we would normally let parents know that the subs are expected in a general newsletter if it is timely, else the leaders will try and mention it verbally. So thank you to everyone who paid promptly, your co-operation is very much appreciated. The administration required to track the payments can be very time consuming, and individual reminders are only sent out if payments have not been made after 4 weeks. This system is working well and achieving a low level of non- payment of subscription which has helped greatly to minimise deficits between our normal incomes against the expected expenditures. Additionally, a monthly direct debit option is available on request, it is worth emphasising that it is important that the instructions need to be followed in order that the subscription can be tracked to the member making the payment!

In addition to our current account, we also have funds in a Reserve Account, the total amount held is considered to be sufficient to allow us to continue to operate the normal activities of the group for 12 months should income and fundraising activities fall short, as well as having adequate provision for future maintenance / disposal of our Storage Facility at Hensingham School.

The major source of additional income to supplement our income from subscription remains our annual Gift Aid claim. The main fundraising carried out this year was yet again the successful bag packing at Morrisons, which enables this year's Family Camp to be substantially subsidised by the Group. We have also received a donation of £1400 from the 8th Whitehaven Scout Group, which is their remaining assets on dissolution and merger with our group and is in accordance with charitable law. Additionally, due to the good will and contacts of some parents, the Scouts Easter camp expenses came under budget, almost all the refunds were kindly given back by the parents, these generous donations and the additional money from gift aid have further boosted the Group Funds. We have invested some of the available funds on equipment expenditures, including camping equipment, spare waterproof clothing and mobile phones for the benefit of the whole group.

The year-end accounts for the previous year 2011/12 were complied and the Annual Returns and the accounts were submitted to the Charity Commission using the on line account and the Trustee information updated. A summary of our accounts is available on the Charity Commission website.

Fundraising

We had a bag packing day at Morrisons in Whitehaven again this year. Once again we were fortunate to be allocated the eve of Mothers' day in what has become a bit of annual tradition. Our young people (and the adults) worked very hard indeed and we managed to raise a very credible £1560. I would like to express the group's gratitude to Morrisons for their hospitality. We have provisionally booked the corresponding weekend for March 2014 for our next bag packing fundraiser so please put that date in your diaries.

The group also benefit significantly from claiming back Gift Aid on membership fees. This year we have claimed back over £1400. So if you or your partner are a UK taxpayer and haven't filled in a Gift Aid form please do so at the earliest opportunity.

The Future

Although parental support is fantastic within 1st Hensingham, our size means that we always need help! We can never have enough volunteers.

Following the loss of the Old Mirehouse Scout Hut the group have taken the opportunity to go into to partnership with Moresby Primary School to develop a multiuse Scout Headquarters/Pre-School/Nursery facility. The two parties are currently undertaking a feasibility study in to the joint venture. This will be a significant undertaking for the group and we will need support from all members of the group during this project.
