SCOUTS

It's been another busy year for our two Troops with our Scouts earning over 20 Challenge Awards and 139 activity badges between them.

A huge congratulations to Zack Evans and Josh Brocklebank on achiving their Chief Scout's Gold Awards. This is the top award for the Scout section and earning it requires a significant commitment as Scouts must gain all nine of the Challenge Awards plus earn at least 6 activity badges. We don't get to award many so it's been a priviledge to see two of our Scouts complete it!

It's sometimes hard to get your head around how big Scouting is, so it was great to be able to turn our store into a cyber cafe for a weekend and take part in JOTI (Jamboree on the Internet) last October and chat with other Scouts from all over the world. A big thank you to Sellafield Ltd for the donation of laptops that made it possible – now that we're fully equipped, we're hoping to do it again this year!



Through the year our Scouts have been getting creative with pancake art, sock puppet theatre, building bat boxes and, thanks to a national partnership with Games Workshop, entering the Warhammer universe to complete the Model Maker badge.



Fire and food continue to be a univeral favourite, especially when combined so, as well as planning and cooking our own menus on gas, we've cooked foil packet "cowboy suppers" and discovered woofums (anyone who made it to family camp will know what we're talking about).



As part of the World Challenge Award, we've really enjoyed working with the West Cumbria River's Trust, including tree planting at Walkmill Woods, making bat boxes and himalayan balsam bashing. Also on a community theme, it was great to have Dan, some of our Scouts' parents and their colleagues from Wasdale Mountain Rescue join us for an evening to explain what they do and "rescue" our accident prone leaders.



Throughout the year we've also refreshed some our traditional Scouting skills (knots, first aid, navigation, axe & saw skills). Although we've struggled to fit in as much as we'd hoped, we have managed some weekend activities including climbing and air rifle shooting.

March saw us heading to Rattlingate for a different style of camp, inspired by our Scouting friends in

Denmark. Starting with a bare blade and a piece of wood, we carved our own whittling knives and then made a custom sheath from leather.

As well as family camp, the summer term saw some of our older Scouts join forces with 3rd Cleator Moor to finally complete their Expedition Challenge in the South Lakes, hiking over two days solving some tricky navigation challenges created by the local farmers and surviving some torrential weather along the way!



Our highlight of the summer was undoubtedly our summer camp at Great Tower (near Windermere). We camped for 7 nights with an action packed programme including climbing, tomahawk throwing, geocahing, high ropes activities, paddleboarding and ghyll scrambling. We also put our pioneering skills to the test building a pontoon bridge and went Wally Hunting.



Looking ahead to the coming year we have a patrol camp planned for the end of September and are hoping to go to the Red Rose jamboree next summer, with hopefully a few more camps in between. We're also hoping to run another Master at Arms shooting course, as well as odd hikes, climbing and hopefully some water activities through the year.



None of our amazing programme would happen without the support of our volunteer leaders; so on behalf of both Troops, a huge thank you to Drew, lona, Mike, Nic, Nikita, Josh, Sam, Paul, Dan & Stuart for their enthusiasm, energy and giving up so much time to help deliver all of our activities. Also, a huge thank you to the parents who've supported some of our activities this year. Finally, as leaders, we're lucky to get work with a great group of young people and we'd like to thank all our Scouts for their energy and always being willing to give things a go and embrace some of our bizarre and crazy activities.

Treasurer's Report

The group finances for the financial year 2022/2023 remain healthy.

We have had a review of the members subscriptions and we are postponing any increase at the moment. If anyone is suffering from any hardship please speak to your leader, any information that is discussed is confidential.

With just over 100 members and approximately 30/40 new starters/leavers each year our subscription and subsequent accounts are constantly changing.

The Online Scout Manager (OSM) system is now the main method of payment for subscriptions and various events. Could I please ask if you don't currently use this system if you would consider using it.

The major source of normal income to supplement our funds from subscriptions remains our annual Gift Aid claim. With your help, gift aiding generated income to just over £1700 this year. If you haven't signed up but are eligible, please do so – it's very simple and won't cost you a thing. Gift Aid is essential in helping the group finances go further together subs and the money claimed from Gift Aid cover the basic running costs of the group.

We are more or less back to normal after the pandemic and we ran camps which was great for all members involved.

As usual, the annual return and the year-end accounts for the previous year (2021/2022) and updated trustee information were submitted to the Charity Commission. A summary of our accounts is available on the Charity Commission website.

Finally I would like to take this opportunity to thank all our sponsors and benefactors for their continued support during this year.

General

The Executive committee has continued to provide management oversight and administration to the 1st Hensingham Scouts Group.

From April 2023, the Executive Committee and Executive Committee Members were rebranded as a Trustee Boards and Trustees respectively.

The Trustees make sure the charity is well managed, risks are assessed and mitigated, buildings and equipment are in good working order, and everyone follows legal requirements and Policy, Organisation and Rules.

The Trustees' support helps the section leaders run a fantastic programme that gives our young people skills for life and experiences they'll remember forever.

So the Trustees are an essential cog in the wheel of a successful scouting group, this year we've managed to recruit John Smallman onto the Trustee Board, volunteers are always welcome. Sadly we have lost our long standing secretary Gemma Pattinson; I would like to take this opportunity to thank Gemma for her contribution.

As a Trustees Board we have continued to work in the background dealing with the usual financial, maintenance, rental, insurance, safety and training issues.

Equipment store

We continue to lease the equipment store at the Sneckyeat Industrial estate, with 4 years left to run on our current leasing arrangement.

This facility continues to provide invaluable storage and easy access of plant and equipment.

Hensingham School

We are now in the process of negotiating the extension of our current agreement with Hensingham School. Our current lease concludes in September and it's essential that we extend this arrangement.

Funding

The group continues to maintain a healthy financial position.

As a result of this the Executive took the decision to hold funds at the 2022 level, we considered this a prudent decision particularly when considering the current cost of living increasing that everyone is experiencing.

Throughout the year the group has purchased bat detectors, new mobile phones, new event shelters, new harnesses and tables.

Hardship

As a Trustee Board we recognise that the cost of living crisis places a significant burden on some families, with scouting activities one of the first casualties of a tightening family budget.

As a consequence, this year, we have increased our hardship fund budget and now review any requests in each of our board meetings.

The hardship fund is available to support any member of the Group whose financial circumstances are now stretched with the cost of scouting.
